FIRST NATION COLLABORATION AND OPPORTUNITIES April 2021

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) is located on the traditional territories of the region's 14 First Nations as well as the Office of the Wet'suwet'en and Carrier Sekani Tribal Council.

Provincial Agreements currently being implemented:

- ➤ Pathways Forward 2.0 Agreement (Province and Carrier Sekani Tribal Council on their own behalf and on behalf of their members 2020)
- Lake Babine Nation Foundation Agreement (2020)
- ➤ Wet'suwet'en Memorandum of Understanding (Canada, British Columbia and Wet'suwet'en as agreed on February 29, 2020)
- ➤ Cheslatta Carrier Nation Interim Reconciliation Agreement (2019)




Challenges for the RDBN-Capacity

- ➤ Regional District consultation by the Province took place near the completion of its process with First Nations and signing of agreements were imminent
 - Requires the RDBN to get up to speed, but with no input on impacts
 - RDBN continues to lobby Province to be part of the discussion at beginning
- First Nations with Agreements currently signed and being implemented have reached out to engage the Regional District
- ➤ Wet'suwet'en MOU Core Advisory Table
- First Nations formed alliances to build a strong voice on concerns and issues in the region
 - Nechako First Nations and support of the Nechako River

2018 UBCM CONVENTION

The conversation started at AVICC in 2018 and continued with...

- Morning Panel CCRD & ACRD with Guests describing the situation
- ▶ **B150** Financing Reconciliation: Solutions for Local Communities (Central Coast RD)
- ► Therefore be it resolved that UBCM request the Province of BC and the Government of Canada work with First Nations and local governments to <u>explore and implement revenue solutions such as</u> <u>federal transfer payments</u>, thereby supporting implementation of the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action and the commitments in UNDRIP;
- And be it further resolved that to <u>ensure First Nation participation in the management of said payments</u>, UBCM request British Columbia, in consultation with First Nations, <u>amend the Local Government Act</u> accordingly.
- On motion, was Endorsed

2018 UBCM CONVENTION

OF1 Building Understanding of Financing Reconciliation: Solutions Alberni-Clayoquot RD for Local Communities

- ► Therefore be it resolved, that UBCM work with the Central Coast Regional District and Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District to host-a-provincial-community-forum on Resolution B150 Financing Reconciliation: Solutions for Local Communities, with local governments and appropriate First Nations governing bodies;
- ► And be it further resolved that UBCM hold a three hour workshop on Resolutions B150 Financing Reconciliation: Solutions for Local Communities at the 2019 Annual Convention.
- On motion, was Endorsed

FINANCING RECONCILIATION (2019) pre session

- ▶ 9:00am 4:30 pm
- ▶ In 2018, members endorsed resolution B150, calling on the Province and Federal Government to identify approaches to better finance local government and First Nation service delivery in ways that support the implementation of Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action and the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. This session will bring together representatives from First Nations, local government and academia to consider opportunities and next steps for advancing new approaches to financing reconciliation. The session will also feature general updates on Indigenous relations in BC. Lunch will be provided.

Minister Robinson (letter December 13, 2019) to CCRD Chair Sam Schooner ACRD Chair John Jack

"In response to your request, I hope we can agree to use this opportunity to set up a staff-level working group, with the mandate to explore the governance and financial interest in non-treat First Nations seeking a stronger governance link with regional district boards"

The RDKB was recently recognized by Government of B.C. for embracing the conversion to EVs in our fleet and including EV charging in all future facility projects.





RDKB EV Fleet Strategy

Corporate commitment towards Carbon Neutral

- In 2019, 44% below 2008 greenhouse gas emissions levels
- Our fleet & transport
 - ✓ EV pilot bought EV and installed EV charger in 2019
 - ✓ Bought two more EVs in 2020 and plan to buy a fourth in 2021
 - ✓ Continue to install EV chargers at RDKB facilities
 - ✓ Completed EV infrastructure study & low carbon fleet plan = clear roadmap to full electrification & low carbon fleet
 - ✓ Building off the Accelerate Kootenays project, the network of charging stations along the Highway 3 corridor continues to grow



Expansion to Region-Wide Curbside Organics Collection





Highlights – West Side

- Currently, RDKB provides curbside organics collection and processing throughout the municipalities and electoral areas of the Boundary region (the western half of the RD) for household kitchen waste
- The Boundary Landfill organics processing facility being upgraded to accommodate commercial, industrial and institutional organics



Highlights – East Side

- The RDKB is expanding curbside organics collection program to all municipalities and electoral areas of the RD (the east side) by the fall of 2022.
- RDCK successful in receiving grant through CleanBC Organics Infrastructure Program for construction of an organics processing facility at the Central Landfill, near Salmo, BC.. RDKB has committed to supply and/or direct organic food waste to RDCK processing facility.
- RDKB has completed preliminary design for a transfer station at eastern landfill site and applied for a 90% funded grant for project construction, and an additional grant under the CleanBC Organic Infrastructure and Collection Program for residential curbside green bin collection programs.





Okanagan Lake Protection Strategy

- Co-led by the Okanagan Nation Alliance, conservation organizations, and the Regional District
- Objectives:
 - Development of a strategy that will enhance the ways of caring for, protecting, and restoring the values and interests of Okanagan Lake foreshore and associated tributaries within the watershed
- Funded by the Province of B.C., Environment Canada, Vancouver Foundation, and the Okanagan Basin Water Board

Regional Floodplain Management Plan

- Honorable Mention 2020 UBCM Community Excellence Awards
- SILGA 2020 Community Excellence Award
- UBCM Community Emergency Preparedness Fund:
 - \$150k for Flood Hazard Mapping & Risk Assessments Phase 2
 - \$150k for Flood Mitigation Planning Phase 3
- Collaboration:
 - City of Kelowna, City of West Kelowna, District of Lake Country, District of Peachland, Westbank First Nation, Okanagan Indian Band

- Reduce flood risk
- Improve emergency response

Emergency Preparedness

 - Community Emergency Preparedness Fund
 - \$25k to complete an Evacuation Route Plan
- Collaboration:
 - Emergency Operations Centre, Fire Departments, RCMP, Westbank First Nation, and member municipalities
