The new Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw #2006 is now active and states that:

You must "store garbage containers in a location not accessible by wildlife" when not at the curb.

Garbage containers must only be placed at the curb between 6:00am and midnight on the day of collection.

"Wildlife" includes: Bear, Cougar, Wolf, Coyote, Crow or Raven



Please ensure all wildlife attractants are managed responsibly.

- Applications evaluated by mid February
 - Value of contribution
 - Steps already taken towards reducing conflict
 - Existence of program already (consistency and equal access)




- Notifications usually come out by mid-March
- Programs typically run May-November





- Programs are awarded and the application form is the official agreement between BCCF and you.
- We advertise for, hire, train, support and supervise the community coordinator.
- The community provides a liaison (and at times other in-kind support).
- At the year end we can provide an annual report and a complete accounting of monies spent on your behalf.
