New/Revised Concepts:

- Revised framework for Disaster Financial Assistance

Ministry of Municipal Affairs exploring options for improved consideration of natural hazards in new development decisions





- Enhanced administrative fairness
- Enhanced transparency
- Clarified process and timelines
- Details will remain in regulation, e.g. eligibility criteria and reimbursement



Changes for local authorities

- New responsibilities (phased)
 - More comprehensive EM plans
 - Required risk assessments
 - Stronger collaboration
 - Required engagement with neighbouring First Nations and EM partners
- Refinements to States of Local Emergency
- New Recovery Transition Period



Co-development

- Required under Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act
- Working with First Nations Leadership Council, First Nations rights and title holders and Modern Treaty Nations
- Engaging with Metis Nation of BC, BC Association of Aboriginal Friendship Centres and First Nations Health Authority
- Outcome will inform the new legislation, creating pathways for greater understanding and shared decision making





- Ongoing legislative development

- Start of implementation planning
- New legislation currently targeted for fall 2022
