Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act

- The Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (Declaration Act) implements the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UN Declaration), which the Truth and Reconciliation Commission confirms as the framework for reconciliation.
- Unanimously approved by the legislature November 2019, the Declaration Act enables legislative, regulatory, policy and operational changes to be made over time to support implementation.



Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act

- It requires government, in consultation and cooperation with Indigenous peoples to:
 - Ensure new and existing laws are consistent with the UN Declaration
 - Develop and implement an action plan to achieve the objectives of the UN Declaration
 - Monitor progress through public annual reporting
- It enables new decision-making agreements between B.C. and Indigenous governing bodies on decisions that directly affect Indigenous peoples.

Action Plan



- Draft released June 11, 2021; Final released March 30, 2022
- 5 year plan; 89 priority actions
- Strategic, provincial-scale, whole-of-government document that identifies short-, medium-, and long-term actions that reflect priorities identified in collaboration with Indigenous peoples
- Action plan is not intended to limit, but rather supplement, ongoing reconciliation work that will continue whether or not it's in the action plan.

Action plan cont.



The actions identified in the plan are broken into themes:

1.Self-Determination and Inherent Right of Self-Government

2. Title and Rights of Indigenous Peoples

3. Ending Indigenous-specific racism and discrimination

4. Social, cultural and economic well-being

Action plan cont.



Items directly referencing local governments:

- 1.11 Support inclusive regional governance by advancing First Nations participation in regional district boards.
- This Action was first raised by UBCM membership via resolutions 2018-B150 and OF1.
- 4.27 Review the principles and processes that guide the naming of municipalities and regional districts, and evolve practices to foster reconciliation in local processes.
- This Action was raised by First Nations and local governments in feedback to the Draft Action Plan

Declaration Act Secretariat



- Separate body
- Will guide government's legislative priorities and engagement with Indigenous peoples and governments,
- Including providing clear policy and process advice on consultation and cooperation requirements, and
- Developing measures to ensure changes in legislation are consistent with the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples

Impacts on local governments



No immediate effects on local government legislation

• Provincial laws will be brought into alignment over time

<u>3a-2.2 – First Nations Economic Opportunity Portal Social Value Procurement</u> Shared prosperity is an essential component of the CRD's path to Reconciliation. This initiative "I advance the First Nation Reconciliation Board Priority by drawing out connections between "Nations, First Nations' businesses and CRD procurement.

Jojective of initiative is to establish a First Nations Economic Opportunity Portal, an entry Joint to the CRD Business Opportunities registry that is tailored for First Nations and First Nations businesses. It will also build additional structures in the CRD Procurement Policy that emphasizes Social Procurement Values. Finally, the initiative will form as the foundation for the CRD to build a First Nations' Skills Index and Service Database. As First Nations continue to develop their business interests and capacity, they will be able to register their businesses with the CRD so that staff can begin to draw from established First Nations businesses when looking to procure goods or services.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

In 2002, a dispute arose between the City and Tla'amin Nation. The City did not share their plans to build a sea walk and construction disturbed destroyed and buried significant Tla'amin cultural sites including petroglyphs and shell middens. Acknowledging the mistake. City leaders handed over the \$1.5 million contract to build the sea walk to Tla'amin Nation (then Sliammon First Nation). Through this, Ta'amin was able to protect cultural heritage sites provid
