





Commit to not expanding municipal boundaries, building up, not out; zone & maintain a database of land suitable for food-related businesses.



Ensure that higher density housing, particularly for those on lower incomes. is well connected to public transit and enables ready access to venues with healthy food (including emergency food services).



Establish and implement targets for local food procurement at all City venues and events that serve food.



Enable permanent location with high pedestrian traffic for the Farmers Market. with indoor option for winter markets.



Create a Food Charter: support and participate in a food policy council.

barriers to food gardens on private lots (front, side and backvard options): develop and pass bylaws that permit backyard flocks, meat rabbits, and beekeeping.

Assess and remove



Establish municipal and household organic waste composting and make finished compost available at low or no cost for food production in private and public gardens.



Undertake an assessment of city-owned land most suitable for public food-related activities: lower barriers to access and use (harvest festivals, community aardens, foodbased events).



Eaters	Privilege local foods and eat seasonally. Adapt food budgets to allocate larger portion to support local food businesses and save money on other items.	Endorse and support organizations working to build local food system; build knowledge of food systems and policy needs & opportunities	Plan food choices day by day and year round to minimize environmental / climate impact of choices
Foundations / Funders / Supporters	Continue to invest in local infrastructure for which it is hard to make a business case in a sparsely populated region in a globalized food marketplace.	Support industry and civil society organizations to network, share information, build capacity to create systems change and relocalize food.	Support knowledge generation and transfer
Local Government	Link business licences to local procurement targets, where possible	Develop and implement food security, water use, and agriculture plans.	Integrate local food production / resilience as a highest and best use in all suitable zones, official community plans.

Takeaways

- High impacts though good policy development
- Collaboration is key
- Help contribute and fund food organizations to be able to leverage additional funding
- Explore if existing policies are creating barriers to advancing your communities food system (ex: greenhouses or farm stands)
- Make a food a priority like housing and childcare
- When developing food and farm plans, include implementation planning and ongoing funding/staff support



Local Government Partnership Program: Current Program Design & Ideas for Renewal UBCM Panel Septebmer 15, 2022



Local Government Partnership Program (LGPP)

- Support BC communities to integrate agricultural strategy into community planning decisions
- Cost-shared funding to develop, update and implement agricultural planning tools
- Successor to Local Government Agricultural Planning Program
- Relaunched as LGPP in April 2021
- Funding from the Agri-Food Futures Fund



LGPP: Program Design

- \$500K cost-shared funding available
- Up to \$40K per project
- 15 projects approved
- Applicants were local governments
- Demonstrate political support and plans to implement
- Compliments and supported by Provincial Strengthening Farming Program



Key Lessons from Program

- Broad community support needed to implement
- Flexibility in project time-frame
- Strong interest and uptake in First Nations
- Continued need for this support for updating and implementation



Future Program Design

- We propose shifting the focus away from short-term competitiveness towards long-term resilience, especially with regards to climate change
- Support targeted activities
- Partnership and sharing across regions and between different levels of government
