## Background

- The *Fire Safety Act* (FSA) was given Royal Assent in 2016 to modernize fire safety legislation.
- As the FSA was not brought into force, the Fire Services Act remains in effect.
- Some local authorities have expressed concern about the implementation delay.
- Before bringing the FSA into force, amendments are needed to reflect the Province's goal of a single standard of fire safety in BC and to ensure successful implementation.





## Modernizing Fire Safety Legislation

- Key changes between the Fire Services Act and the Fire Safety Act include:
  - A system of risk-based compliance monitoring
  - Streamlined processes for fire inspection and investigation
  - Improved powers for local authorities to mitigate imminent fire risks rather than refer those concerns to the province
  - Processes for local authorities to evacuate and secure buildings when there is an immediate risk to life and safety
  - Risk-based model for fire code compliance monitoring will help local authorities apply fire prevention and inspection efforts where the need is greatest
  - A manageable and streamlined out-of-court enforcement system with administrative penalties aimed at improving compliance





#### Timeline

• In 2018, the Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General first indicated government's intention to implement a single standard of fire safety and directed the Office of the Fire Commissioner to work collaboratively with UBCM to understand and mitigate regional district concerns.

 In 2022, the Single Standard of Fire Safety working group convened with members from UBCM representing regional districts, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs, EMBC and OFC.





### Scope and Goals

- The proposed amendments being considered largely focus on the requirements for risk-based compliance monitoring and fire safety inspections of public buildings in regional districts.
- The proposed amendments are intended to:
  - Increase building-owner compliance with the BC fire code
  - Increase the efficiency of fire services through a risk-based inspection schedule
  - Introduce an administrative monetary penalty system to encourage compliance
  - Increase public safety and the safety of fire fighters
  - Help prevent fire-related injuries and deaths
- These changes work towards achieving a single standard of fire safety in BC.





## Engagement

  - Single Standard of Fire Safety Working Group with representatives from regional districts, UBCM, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs, EMBC/OFC

  - Fire Chiefs' Association of BC
