#### **Child Care Matters**

**Quality child care is important:** 

- For children –quality child care benefits children cognitively, socially, intellectually, emotionally and physically
- For parents helps balance work, school and family; provides opportunities for sharing, learning, networking and referrals
- For business helps business hire and retain employees
- For society lays the foundation for school success, higher education, development of social-emotional skills and life-long learning





# **Relationships Matter**

The Burnaby School District has been working with community-based child care providers to integrate child care into schools and on school grounds since 1970.

- Longstanding relationship with the City of Burnaby
- Strong partnerships with local child care providers





# **Burnaby Needs Assessment**

Burnaby findings:

- a minimum of **1,800** new full-time licensed spaces are needed by 2031 to maintain current levels of child care provision
- Need is greatest for Infant/Toddler spaces and School Age spaces
- More spaces are needed in Northwest and Southeast Quadrants

# **Board Recommendation**

In 2019 the Burnaby Board of Education recommended that the district pursue full cost recovery child care funding from the Ministry of Children and Family Development for K/1 and grade 2+ child care; and partner with the City of Burnaby for infant/toddler and 3-5 year old child care.




Project Definition Report: Before and After School Childcare Creating a Plan for Childcare Opportunities within the Burnaby School District

# Site Selection Criteria

- ✓ Neighbouring schools in area of high need for child care;
- ✓ Feedback collected during the community consultation process;
- ✓ Distribution of new child care programs throughout the City;
- Seismic mitigation project versus new build capital project;
- Current child care sites where providers have in excess of 50 children on their waitlists; and,
- ✓ The Parent Advisory Council and principal have identified the school community as being an area of high need.



# **Additional Selection Criteria**

- ✓ Coordination with City of Burnaby child care initiatives;
- ✓ District Long-Range
  - Facility Plan; and,
- ✓ District recovery of classrooms.
