

### Recommendation #2

- Recommendation #2 to "declare the conservation and management of ecosystem health and biodiversity of British Columbia ... as an overarching priority and enact legislation that legally establishes this priority for all sectors".
- Applies to all sectors and ecosystem types



## B.C. Biodiversity and Ecosystem Health Framework

Recommendation #2 involves transformative change across all sectors and ecosystem types.

   Framework to manage for
   ecosystem health and minimize
   biodiversity risks (Phase 1)
- Develop/update legislation and other enabling tools to implement the Framework (Phase 2).

### A New Direction for Wildlife and Habitat Stewardship in BC

British Columbia has the greatest diversity of species, ecosystems and habitats of any province in Canada.

The Province's biodiversity is globally significant and includes species not found anywhere else on earth.

#### It is special - it is important.

Our rich natural diversity is inextricably linked to our history, our way of life, and our prosperity.

Wildlife provides us with social, economic, environmental and cultural benefits.

#### But it is more than that.

For many of us, wildlife and habitat are intrinsic to our identity and our way of being.

- BC occupies only 10% of Canada's landmass, yet is home to nearly 40% of the country's wildlife and plant species.
- BC likely has over 75,000 species of animals, plants and fungi.



Our province's rich natural abundance is a gift and a responsibility.



STRATEGY	ECOSYSTEM HEALTH VISION
Together for Wildlife	<b>Thriving wildlife</b> in their habitats, <b>resilience</b> to change, reduced threats to native species
Marine Plan Partnership for the North Pacific Coast	Ecosystem-based management, ecological integrity, human well-being
Watershed Security Strategy and Fund	Healthy watersheds, biophysical indicators together with human social, environmental, and economic systems
Coastal Marine Strategy	Healthy and productive coast, biodiversity, stability, ecosystem function that delivers a range of benefits for people
Flood Strategy	Ecosystem services and environmental sustainability linked to public health and safety
Modernized Land Use Planning	Connection between healthy ecosystems and well-being of communities, Reconciliation
Climate Preparedness and Adaptation Strategy	Species and ecosystem resilience, core principles laid out through human values and needs

### Metro Vancouver's Ecological Health Framework

- This Framework provides guiding principles, goals, and strategies to help achieve the vision of "a beautiful, healthy, and resilient environment for current and future generations in Metro Vancouver."
- It identifies ways the region can sustain local ecosystem services through the management of parks, watersheds, water resources, waste, air quality, and more.
- The Framework creates a foundation for integrating ecological health into Metro Vancouver's corporate decision making, and sets requirements for monitoring, reporting and review.



## Next Steps

- Regional engagement and collaboration sessions with First Nations and multi-sectors (including ENGOs, UBCM, industry sectors and organizations)- Late March-May 2023
- Framework focused webinars with First Nations and multi-sectors
   April to early May
- Draft co-developed Framework expected by early June 2023, followed by consultation with Rights and Title Holders- June 2023
