Policing Landscape

No systemic updating of the *Police Act* for over four decades

Limited support for police response to complex social issues

Need for alignment with British Columbia Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act National and international incidents involving police use-of-force against BIPOC

Call for an improved police oversight model

Call for a culturally competent and trauma-informed approach in police training

Evolving policing landscape across Canada



Training should reflect community values and priorities

Police Governance in BC

Municipal police departments

- Overseen by an appointed police board made up of volunteer community members and one local elected official.
- Board members are chosen based on:
 - o Skills
 - o Qualifications
 - o Diversity
 - o Demonstrated ability to act in the public interest
- Police boards are tasked with complex duties, such as setting the priorities, goals, and objectives of the
 police department, establishing policies, and developing the annual police department budget.

RCMP Governance

• The RCMP is under federal jurisdiction. They do not establish a police board but may have "local police committees" or other groups to promote a stronger relationship between the community and the local RCMP.

Integrated Policing Units

- Provide policing services to more than one jurisdiction and may include members from independent municipal, RCMP municipal, provincial, and federal policing services.
- Integrated teams are not required to be governed or overseen by a police board.
