CCBF IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

In June 2024, UBCM entered into a renewed 10-year Canada Community-Building Fund Agreement with the Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia. The new Agreement will provide more than \$3.6 billion in federal funding to support local government infrastructure priorities through 2034.

The renewal ensures that the CCBF in BC will continue to deliver stable, dedicated federal funding that supports national priorities including productivity and economic growth, a clean environment, and strong, resilient communities.

This CCBF Outcomes Report provides an overview of the first year of implementation under the renewed Agreement, including project outputs and outcomes, communications and outreach initiatives, asset management advancements, and how investments helped address infrastructure gaps related to housing pressures across the province.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE RENEWED CCBF AGREEMENT

The updated Agreement maintains many core program elements that have been in place for nearly two decades, including:

- A long-term Agreement with dedicated and predictable funding
- Three program delivery streams: Community Works Fund, Strategic Priorities Fund, and Metro Vancouver Regional Fund
- A per-capita funding formula with a base amount
- Semi-annual fund transfers
- A broad range of eligible infrastructure investment categories
- Annual transfer amounts maintained with annual indexing
- Annual reporting on expenditures

Enhancements introduced in the 2024–2034 Agreement include:

- A new investment category for resilience infrastructure projects
- Expansion of the Fire Hall category to include fire trucks
- Expansion of the Capacity Building category to include planning related to housing and growth
- Additional support for local government asset management practices

2024 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Between January 1 and December 31, 2024, UBCM transferred \$149 million to local governments and TransLink, resulting in \$422.3 million in reported spending across 988 projects throughout BC, 556 of these were reported complete and contribute outcomes to this report.



- 33,400 m³ of improved daily wastewater treatment
- 969,000 m² of improved sport and recreational infrastructure
- Nine new fire engines for emergency responses
- 83,346 households experiencing improved solid waste collection and diversion
- 12,261,000 km² of improved broadband connectivity in rural and remote areas

PROGRAM STREAMS

The Canada Community-Building Fund in British Columbia is delivered through three distinct program streams: the Community Works Fund, the Strategic Priorities Fund and the Metro Vancouver Regional Fund. Projects from all three funding streams contribute outcomes data to this report.

Community Works Fund

The Community Works Fund (CWF) is delivered to all local governments in British Columbia, twice annually. Funding amounts are determined using a per capita funding formula and include a funding floor that is equal for all recipients. Local governments select which projects to fund, based on local priorities, and report back to UBCM on the outputs and outcomes of each project.

In 2024, 533 CWF projects were reported complete and are included in the outcomes and outputs data in this report. These projects have a total project cost of \$386 million and received over \$151.5 million in CCBF funding.

The majority of this \$151.5 million, was invested into new and improved local roads, bridges and active transportation corridors as \$80.2 million (53%) of CWF funds were invested into 231 kilometers of new or improved roadway. Additionally, \$22 million (15%) went toward improving 988 m² of recreation and sport court infrastructure at 87 community facilities. Community Energy Systems (\$11 million), wastewater (\$8.7 million), drinking water (\$7.6 million) and Fire Halls (\$7.1 million) averaged 5% of total expenditures in the CWF category.

Strategic Priorities Fund

The Strategic Priorities Fund (SPF) is an application-based grant available to local governments outside of the Metro Vancouver region that support projects that are either large in scale, regional in impact, or innovative, and that align with the program's objectives of supporting productivity and economic growth, a clean environment, and strong cities and communities. SPF intakes in 2015, 2017 and 2022 resulted in the approval of 220 projects totaling over \$398.5 million in CCBF funding. The first intake under the new 2024-2034 CCBF agreement opened for applications in 2025.

Outcomes and outputs from 15 complete SPF projects are included in this report. These projects represent nearly \$36.5 million in total project costs and \$30.8 million of CCBF investment.

Metro Vancouver Regional Fund

The Metro Vancouver Regional Fund (MVRF) pools a percentage of Metro Vancouver and member municipalities' per capita allocation to support regional transportation projects proposed by TransLink. All projects under the MVRF program are approved by the Metro Vancouver Regional District Board and support TransLink's long-term capital plan. Over the 10-year MVRF Agreement, UBCM will deliver approximately \$1.8 billion in federal funds to TransLink for regional transportation investments in the Metro area.

Summary of Outcomes Reporting Period

In 2024, 988 CCBF projects were reported to UBCM as ongoing or complete projects. Of these projects, CCBF recipients reported 556 complete capital infrastructure and capacity building projects. These projects represent over \$287.6 million of CCBF investment and \$531.7 million in total project costs.

Methodology

For this report, UBCM collected output and outcome data on all CCBF projects reported as complete between January 1, 2024 and December 31, 2024. This resulted in the analysis of 556 distinct projects. Outputs and outcomes were determined using the 2024-2034 CCBF Outcomes Reporting Guide developed by Housing Infrastructure and Communities Canada (HICC).

As recipients were permitted to select only one output and outcome per project, this report likely understates the overall impact of these investments on communities across British Columbia. For example, a drinking water project that includes both treatment upgrade and distribution pipes could be reported under a single output – either length of pipe(meters), or number of improved facilities. Similarly, the same project could be reported under a single outcome – either number of households experiencing increased or improved service, or volume in total water treated daily.

In addition to the outputs and outcomes defined by HICC, UBCM collected data on the type of investment associated with each project: New Construction and Expansion; Enhancement and Rehabilitation; or Replacement. For the purposes of this report, these three investment types were aligned with housing outcomes as follows:

Enable – New Construction and Expansion

Projects that create the conditions needed for new housing development.

Support – Enhancement and Rehabilitation

Projects that help existing or planned housing function well, by improving quality of life, access, or affordability.

Preserve – Replacement

Protects that protect or maintain existing housing from being lost, damaged, or made uninhabitable.

INVESTMENT CATEGORIES ANALYSIS

Local Roads, Bridges, Active Transportation

Local roads, bridges and active transportation is the most popular investment category for the CCBF program historically. For the 2024 reporting period, local roads projects account for 29% of reported projects and 30% of reported spending for complete projects in this report. Seventy-six local governments reported 164 complete projects in this category. These projects improved over 219 kilometers of new or existing road corridors and 170 different support facilities and installations across the province. On average, these projects extended the life of the roadways by 29 years.

Projects under this category include construction, renewal, or improvement of roads, bridges, cycling lanes, sidewalks, paths, interchanges, roundabouts and other essential infrastructure.

Local Roads, Bridges & Active Transportation Project Profile

SIDNEY'S BEACON AVENUE WEST ROUNDABOUT

The main road into the Victoria International Airport is located in one of the region's prime industrial areas. It's also a busy corridor serving three communities, it intersects Highway 17 to connect Sidney's commercial core across the highway, and it's a through-route to Vancouver Island's Swartz Bay ferry terminal. Suffice it to say, commercial development and residential growth in the area have placed noticeable strain on Beacon Avenue West.

A \$5 million contribution from the Strategic Priorities Fund and a cost-sharing agreement between Sidney, North Saanich and the Victoria Airport Authority to make up the remaining \$2.69 million enabled a new five-way roundabout on the road, along with requisite upgrades to pedestrian access, road alignment, lighting, signage and multi-use pathways. The project has improved safety for pedestrians and eased the flow of traffic in the busy thoroughfare.

A news joint release was issued at the time of completion.

Wastewater

In 2024, 24 local governments reported 43 complete projects to improve wastewater and stormwater management. These projects received \$20.7 million of CCBF investment for \$44.5 million of total project cost.

Wastewater projects account for 8% of projects reported and 7% of spending in this report.

Projects under this category include wastewater and stormwater collection, treatment and management systems.

Wastewater Project Profile

EQUIPPING OKANAGAN FALLS WITH SOLIDS PROCESSING CAPABILITY

Before this project was completed, the Okanagan Falls wastewater treatment plant was only able to thicken sludge to about 3-4% solids. Every week, four to six truckloads of sludge were driven 22 kilometres to the wastewater treatment plant in Penticton to be dewatered and composted.

Solids processing capability was added to the Okanagan Falls Wastewater Treatment Plant with \$2.2 million in CCBF funding. Processing solids on site has reduced costs significantly, and entirely removed the emissions from the dozens of monthly truckloads.

While they added solids processing, the local government also installed grit removal equipment which minimizes abrasive wear on downstream wastewater treatment equipment, prevents accumulation in downstream tankage, and diverts heavy, non-biodegradable material from composting, where the dewatered sludge ends up.



Drinking Water

Thirty local governments reported spending \$12.1 million on 56 complete drinking water infrastructure projects.

This represents 10% of projects reported and 4% of spending reported for completed projects. These projects improve drinking water reliability and distribution in communities across the province.

Projects under this category include infrastructure that supports drinking water conservation, collection, treatment and distribution systems.

ESSENTIAL UPDATES TO STEWART'S DRINKING WATER SYSTEM

The small community of Stewart in northwestern BC identified risks to its drinking water quality and public safety with the current system. The old system did not have a water storage reservoir, relying instead on pumps to pressurize in the system. In the event of a supply outage the system would lose pressure allowing groundwater to enter the system, resulting in boil water advisories.

With a \$4.5 million investment from CCBF, the community built a reservoir. With reliable pressure, fewer boil water advisories are issued for residents.


Community Energy Systems

In 2024, 19 local governments reported 33 completed community energy systems projects. These projects invest \$16.3 million of CCBF funds into \$22 million of total cost and help reduce energy consumption at a variety of local government owned facilities. Projects include development, improvement or renewal of infrastructure dedicated to energy generation or efficiency enhancement of existing facilities.

Community Energy Systems Project Profile

HEATING, COOLING AND POWERING SALT SPRING ISLAND FACILITIES – AND ITS RESIDENTS

The Capital Regional District coordinates local government services for the greater Victoria area, and several surrounding unincorporated communities. This year the CRD invested \$260,000 from its CCBF allocation, plus \$85,000 from reserves, to upgrade and renew several small energy systems on Salt Spring Island, an unincorporated community of 12,000 residents in the Gulf Islands.

1. Salt Spring Island's only public library got a new HVAC system with a heat pump which has greatly improved the building's energy efficiency. Importantly, the upgrade also means the facility can be used as a cooling centre during hot weather for the island's 12,000 residents.
2. The Rainbow Road Recreation Centre got two replacement heat pumps, which were essential for maintaining the cool, clean indoor air needed for the centre's recreational programs. The replacement was a priority in Salt Spring Island's parks and recreation 20-year Master Plan.
3. A Level 2 EV charger was installed at Portlock Park to charge the CRD Parks & Recreation's expanding electric fleet, without drawing on existing public chargers. The charger will be owned and operated by the CRD, without third-party involvement.

Recreation and Sport Infrastructure

In 2024, 51 local governments reported 104 recreation and sport infrastructure projects. These projects invested \$22 million into \$58 million worth of community infrastructure.

Recreation and sport infrastructure projects account for 19% of projects and 8% of spending in this report, making it one of the significant investment categories in this outcomes report.

Investments under this category can include facilities such as arenas, swimming pools, sports fields, and networks of parks and recreational trail systems.

SKATE PARK AT LOGAN LAKE'S MAGGS PARK

Logan Lake's 2023 strategic plan prioritized a new skate park as part of its "Enhance Quality of Life" strategic focus. The community participated in multiple consultations leading to the final design.

The skate park features a 10,000 sq. ft. "plethora of shred pasture for the modern skateboarder", according to the enthusiastic local skate club.

"The park is well rounded with an impressive bent bowl and a healthy street section for all who attempt, whether you skate regular, goofy or push mongo. Expect this town to develop some potential athletes in the near future!"

The project was made possible with \$750,000 from Logan Lake's CCBF allocation.

Tourism and Cultural Infrastructure

Nineteen local governments reported 31 complete tourism and cultural infrastructure projects. These projects invested \$4.3 million into \$11.1 million worth of community infrastructure. Tourism and cultural infrastructure projects helped support over 54,500 m² of community space at 28 different facilities, including libraries, theatres, and community halls.

A NEW LIBRARY IN CHETWYND

Chetwynd's old library was 50 years old. The new library, located along the John Hart Highway, is 8,600 sq. ft. with a children's reading and play area, teen reading and lounge area, adult reading and lounge area, public computer area, meeting space, café and dining area, and an outdoor gathering area. The \$5.7 million project was funded with generous donations from the community, and \$736,000 from the Peace River Regional District's CCBF allocation.



Solid Waste

In 2024, 11 local governments reported 12 complete solid waste diversion projects. These projects reported spending \$2.3 million on \$3.1 million worth of infrastructure projects.

Projects include collection, diversion and disposal of recyclables, compostable materials and garbage.

WHISTLER COMPOST FACILITY REHABILITATION

The Resort Municipality of Whistler invested \$1.05 million, including \$581,000 from its CCBF allocation to renew compost facility infrastructure in order to maximize service life and improve system efficiencies. The project included upgrades to stainless steel trays, radio controller infrastructure and transmission gear motor.

Fire Halls and Fire Stations

In 2024, 13 local governments reported 27 complete fire hall and station projects. These projects reported spending \$9.8 million on \$28.5 million worth of infrastructure projects.

Only added as an eligible category in 2021, fire halls & stations has grown to be a popular investment category across different sizes and types of local governments, accounting for 5% of projects and 3% of spending in this report.

SEISMIC UPGRADES TO THE KITSILANO FIRE HALL #12 IN VANCOUVER

The hall built in 1989 was in serious need of seismic upgrades. This fire hall was selected because it was in the right age group (approximately 30 years old) and covers a relatively large geographic area (west of Arbutus Street) where no other fire hall meets current seismic standards.

HIGH SPEED CONNECTION IN MACKENZIE

The District of Mackenzie, in partnership with Internet Service Provider CityWest, brought high speed fibre-optic connectivity to the community. The District previously had no high speed fibre-optic connectivity for residential properties. This partnership covered 720 homes that were ineligible under other project funding, which provided all residential properties the opportunity to access high speed fibre-optic internet.

Resilience and Disaster Mitigation Project Profile

PEACHLAND CONTINUES STRUCTURAL FLOOD MITIGATION

The community of Peachland is located on the shores of the long and large Okanagan Lake. This project continues Peachland's work to protect against floods including the installation of riprap, anchored logs, V-logs and rock groynes (a shore protection structure built perpendicular to the shoreline) from 4th Street to Swim Bay along Beach Avenue for 250 meters.

New landscaping and irrigation and re-decking of the T-dock was also completed. This flood mitigation project will protect critical infrastructure including Beach Avenue, underground utilities, retaining walls, docks and accessibility ramps.

Capacity Building, Asset Management, ICSP, Long-term Infrastructure Planning


In 2024, 33 local governments reported 52 complete capacity building projects. Asset management accounted for 50% of investment (\$3.2 million) and 43% of projects reported. Of the \$3.2 million invested in Asset Management planning, roughly 60% went to projects that invested into asset management software and data integration projects.

Capacity Building Project Profile

KAMLOOPS STRATEGIC PLAN FOR FACILITIES AND ASSET MANAGEMENT

Kamloops' Official Community Plan positions itself as a sustainable, environmentally friendly community that supports active and healthy living and is characterized as resilient, inclusive and vibrant. The City's civic facilities support community services that are core to this vision, and need to be managed sustainably.

Kamloops previously had no single source of information for facilities assets, condition ratings, and level of service or performance. The new Civic Facilities Strategic Master Plan charts Kamloop's direction towards its community vision, enables risk management, and helps deliver sustainable services through civic facilities. The plan is aligned with the 2021 Community Climate Action Plan target to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 40% by 2030.



Public Transit

In 2024, 15 public transportation projects were reported complete by six local governments around the province, and by TransLink in Metro Vancouver. These projects account for \$109.8 million in total project cost and \$105.5 million in CCBF contribution toward the project. This significant investment accounts for 37% of total CCBF spending in 2024, while being concentrated to only 3% of total projects.

METRO VANCOUVER REGIONAL FUND

The following progress report and subsequent information is provided by TransLink and includes complete and in-progress Metro Vancouver Regional Fund projects. Outcomes and output data from complete MVRF projects can be found in the Public Transit section of this report.

PROJECTS WITH SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETE STATUS AS OF 2024:

2020 Conventional Bus Expansion

Procure 55 60' hybrid diesel-electric buses to allow implementation of two new B-lines and six 40' zero emission battery-electric buses to expand service. Acceptance of buses was delayed due to quality concerns and deficiency work. Buses arrived throughout 2023 with final deliveries completed in Q3 2024.

2021 Conventional Bus Expansion

Procure 16 diesel-electric 60' hybrid



articulated buses and nine 40' zero emission battery-electric buses to expand service. Acceptance of buses was delayed due to quality concerns and deficiency work. All buses were accepted and put into service in 2024.

2020 Community Shuttle Vehicles Expansion

Procure nine low-floor community shuttles to expand service. The project

was delayed during COVID-19 for an assessment of ridership recovery. The community shuttles were accepted in 2024 and will be put into service in March 2025.

2021 Community Shuttle Vehicles Expansion

Procure three high-floor community shuttles to expand service. The project was delayed due to COVID-19 for an assessment of ridership recovery. The project was subsequently activated in Q4 2022, and vehicles were in service as of December 2024.



2022 Community Shuttle Vehicles Replacement

Procure 25 high-floor and 39 low-floor community shuttles (64 in total) to retire vehicles that have reached the end of useful life and to modernize the vehicle fleet. The project was delayed due to COVID-19 for an assessment of ridership recovery. The project subsequently restarted in Q4 2022 and vehicles were in service as of December 2024.

2023 Community Shuttle Vehicles Replacement

Procure 18 high-floor and nine low-floor community shuttles (27

in total) to retire vehicles that have reached the end of useful life and to modernize the vehicle fleet. The project was delayed during COVID-19 for an assessment of ridership recovery. All vehicles were in service as of December 2024.

2023 HandyDART Vehicles Replacement

Procure 46 HandyDART vehicles to retire vehicles that have reached the end of useful life and to modernize the HandyDART vehicle fleet. All vehicles were delivered and put into service in 2024.



PROJECTS WITH SUBSTANTIAL SPENDING IN 2024:**Marpole Transit Centre**

The new operation and maintenance facility will handle 300 battery electric buses. Site development advanced through 2024 with ground improvements, site fill, retaining walls, building piles and a flood protection wall.


The Issued for Tender design for the main design packages was completed

in 2024. Additional design is still required for non-critical project scope, with project completion currently expected in 2028.

2023 Conventional Bus Replacement

Procure 50 conventional buses to retire vehicles that have reached the end of useful life and to modernize the vehicle fleet. The project was

delayed due to the reduced capacity of painting subcontractors causing delays in delivery dates. Buses arrived throughout 2024 with the final deliveries completed in Q1 2025.

HOUSING NARRATIVE

The following section provides an overview of progress on CCBF housing commitments and describes how CCBF investments in 2024 helped address infrastructure gaps related to housing pressures in British Columbia.

For the 2024 Outcomes Report, data was collected through the local government annual expenditure reporting system. Recipients were asked to indicate whether their CCBF investments enabled, supported, or preserved housing and to provide additional data if applicable. This information was presented in the September 30, 2025 CCBF Housing Report. A summary of the results reported by recipients is provided below:

- Of the 988 projects reported, 159 were identified as supporting, preserving, or enabling housing in their respective communities (16.2%).
- A total of \$40,350,352 in CCBF funding was spent on projects reported in the 2024 Annual Expenditure Report that preserve, support, or enable housing, representing 9.6% of total CCBF spending in 2024.
- In total, 26,570 housing units were preserved, supported, or enabled through CCBF-funded projects in 2024.
- Of these, 6,929 housing units were enabled, while 19,641 housing units were preserved or supported.
- A total of 1,246 affordable housing units were enabled by CCBF-funded projects.
- 100% of municipalities with a population of 30,000 or greater have completed a Housing Needs Report.

Further to the results from the recipient reporting, UBCM utilized the reported investment type to housing outcome – illustrating how all completed projects enabled, supported, or preserved housing.

Summary of Provincial Progress on Housing Commitments

Through the 2024 Statement of Priorities letter from Canada outlining agreed upon housing commitments, the provincial Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs have provided the following updates. Note that some of the responses cover both 2024 and 2025 updates:

1. Develop housing needs assessments for all communities in British Columbia, which satisfy both federal and provincial requirements.

Provincial response:

- In June 2024, the Province required that local governments complete an Interim Housing Needs Report (HNR) by January 1, 2025.
- As of September 2025, 98% of all local governments in British Columbia have completed an Interim HNR.
- Local Governments are now working to incorporate the information from their HNRs into an update of their Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaws (required by December 31, 2025).

2. Develop provincial housing targets based on evidence of need as part of the Homes for People Action Plan.

Provincial response:

- The Housing Supply Act was implemented in May 2023, allowing the HMA (minister) to set Housing Target Orders.
- As of August 2025, 30 municipalities have delivered 25,710 net new housing units since launch.

3. Continue work on the national building code to include new prefabricated housing (modular) standards to expedite approvals and exploring option of single egress buildings up to 8 storeys.

Provincial response:

- BC Housing (a Crown agency) is leading the development of standardized prefabricated

components to be used for the development of multi-unit residential buildings.

- In 2024, British Columbia enabled single egress stair buildings up to six storeys in height in the BC Building Code.

4. Continue the partnership on building rental housing on public lands through BC Builds to ensure that we are combining our resources to build rental housing for priority groups.

Provincial response:

- BC Builds was officially launched on February 13, 2024 as part of the Homes for People Plan.
- BC Builds partners with government, First Nations, non-profit and community landowners to redevelop underutilized property into housing for middle-income households (3,900 homes underway).
- \$950 million has been committed along with a \$2 billion financing facility. Canada has matched the \$2 billion financing facility through the Apartment Construction Loan Program (ACLP).

5. Take action against bad faith evictions and protect renters from predatory practices.

Provincial response:

- To deter bad faith evictions, government launched the Landlord Use Web Portal, which requires landlords to generate a Notice to End Tenancy in cases of personal use or when a new owner plans to occupy the residence (launched in July 2024). Applications to dispute personal evictions have decreased

by 75.98% in the first year since launch.

- The amount of notice tenants must receive when being evicted for personal use has increased along with the amount of time tenants can dispute the eviction.
- Rent increases for an additional occupant under 19 has been restricted.
- The Residential Tenancy Branch has implemented a facilitated settlement process to help resolve disputes by agreement.
- Updated web content, information sheets, and toolkits have been launched to support access to information.

6. Support the adoption of new construction technologies and cost-effective forms of prefabricated components and homes, through research, knowledge dissemination, and government investments, to improve the productivity of the housing construction sector.

Provincial response:

- The Province has delivered a set of 10 standardized housing designs that provide cost-effective starting points for housing delivery.
- The Province is collaborating internally across government to develop a cross-government strategy to support prefabricated and offsite construction housing.
- BC Housing has developed an innovative software solution (Digitally Accelerated Standardized Housing) that is designed to support rapid uptake of offsite and prefabricated housing for the 4-6 storey Multi-use Residential Building archetype.

Examples of CCBF investments that have been prioritized to support housing supply

Riverside Drive - Drinking Water Service Connections – Grand Forks

The water system upgrade is a crucial step for local development and can facilitate future increases in housing supply. Currently 1 multi family residence is affected and 5 commercial buildings. A planned hotel is in progress, and possible commercial/residential buildings are now possible.

Anderson Avenue and North Park Road Reconstruction –Port Alberni

These offsite works (city cost share) to enable the construction of the Timberline at North Park is an innovative Senior's Independent Living Community with 102 units. Operated by VRS Communities, a non-profit housing provider committed to housing affordability and seniors living services.

Infrastructure Master plan Development for Village Owned Lands – Harrison Hot Springs

This project plans for the potential development of a multi story affordable complex for seniors. Once this development master plan is complete, then staff will begin to look into the complex in more detail, including potential partnerships with Agassiz-Harrison Community Services and BC Builds.

2024 Road Remediation Program – Peachland

Improved access to 3-4 development projects that are adjacent to Princeton Avenue. New 31 lot subdivision on Sanderson which is off of Princeton Avenue. It is anticipated that the repaving of Somerset will facilitate future development in Ponderosa subdivision.

Wastewater Lift Station #1, Capital Upgrades – Zeballos

The Keno Lift Station upgrades ensured continued and reliable sewer

service for the east side of Zeballos, which supports approximately 20 residential properties. Without this infrastructure, existing housing units would face service interruptions or become uninhabitable, jeopardizing housing availability in the community. The project directly preserved the usability of these homes and supported the Village's ability to maintain and potentially expand housing supply in the future.

Sidewalk and Streetlight Replacement, 104 Avenue – Fort St. John

The sidewalk replaced directly affected 20 residences, along with all those in the area that commute by walking and biking. 104 Avenue is a gateway to a grocery store, a pharmacy, a bank, a hair salon, and a few restaurants. Replacing the aging infrastructure will help this neighborhood to grow and prosper.

RECIPIENT COMMUNICATIONS

Recipients issued 19 news releases and hosted four events to announce CCBF funding in communities. Each of these offered an opportunity increase awareness of the ways CCBF funding makes a difference locally.

UNSPENT FUNDS

In 2024, UBCM implemented a five-year spending limit on CCBF funds which requires that any unspent CWF funds as of December 31, 2023, will need to be allocated or expended by December 31, 2028. UBCM will also engage with any local government with a threshold of unspent funds over a certain dollar value to determine plans and timelines for expenditure of CWF funds.

As part of the 2024 reporting cycle, UBCM conducted the annual unspent funds survey. 184 of 188 CCBF recipients responded to the 2024 Unspent Funds survey, accounting for 99% of unspent CCBF funds. 62% of the total unspent funds are committed to be used in the coming years – with the remaining 38% partially committed.

For the 2025 reporting cycle, UBCM will expand the survey to collect more information on timelines for unspent funds to be allocated and projects selected.

ASSET MANAGEMENT

Under the renewed CCBF 2024–2034 agreement, Section 9 and Schedule F introduce enhanced Asset Management Commitments for all Ultimate Recipients. These commitments aim to strengthen asset management capacity and ensure sustainable infrastructure planning and investment.

Ultimate Recipients (local governments, non-local government entities, TransLink and BC Transit) must meet asset management commitments. The commitments will vary based on recipient type and capacity, recognizing differences in organizational size and resources. The focus continues to be on capacity building with an emphasis on improving asset management practices over the agreement term.

Recipients must undertake the following commitments over the period of the agreement:

1. Asset management reporting

- All local governments are required to submit annual asset management data through the Local Government Data Entry (LGDE) System.
- All local governments will commit to a continuous improvement process with respect to asset management practices and asset management data quality.

Timelines: annually over the duration of the CCBF agreement

2. Development and implementation of Long-term financial plans

- All local governments will develop long-term financial plans (LTFP) with a focus on core assets
- Asset Management BC will develop a LTFP Position Statement that will identify LTFP objectives and outcomes

- Further details, including requirements and timelines will be shared in early 2026.

Timelines: To be determined

3. Ongoing asset management education and training

- All local governments will commit in improving asset management awareness, education and training within their respective organizations, including education and training for elected officials, CAOs, CFOs and staff.
- All local governments are required to submit information on education and training, as requested through the CCBF annual reporting.

Timelines: Annual reporting starting in 2024; program education review in 2029

4. Implementing asset management performance measurement

- In addition to the LGDE and CCBF annual reporting requirements, local governments will report on accepted financial indicators including:
 - Operating Surplus Ratio,
 - Asset Sustainability Ratio and,
 - Other KPIs to be determined.

Timelines: annually over the duration of the agreement

Asset Management Reporting

Through a data-sharing agreement with the Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs, UBCM receives annual LGDE Asset Management data. The 2024 data is currently being analyzed, and only high-level results are available for this report.


For 2024, 179 of 188 local governments completed the LGDE Asset Management reporting module – 154 of 161 municipalities and 25 of 27 regional districts.

The following data includes both municipalities (154) and regional districts (25), reporting on: having an asset management strategy in place (68%), having an asset management policy in place (70%) and having a long term financial plan linked to asset management plans (23%). In addition, local governments having an asset management plan in place for; buildings (76%), parks and recreation (57%), water supply (77%), sewer (78%), stormwater (50%) and transportation systems (69%). Local governments that do not own or deliver the service class are excluded from this data.

Asset Management BC

Asset Management BC (AMBC) continues to provide and develop tools and training to support local governments in delivering asset management practices. Ongoing training includes workshops and guides for long-term financial planning and level of service. New online training includes training for elected officials and CAOs called Leveraging Your Asset Data. Risk Management Essentials training is in progress. More information is available on the AMBC website: www.assetmanagementbc.ca

Asset Management Education and Training

A 2024 CCBF Compliance Survey required respondents to answer three questions.

1. Since the last local government election (October 2022), has your local government engaged in asset management education and or training activities?
2. What type of asset management training has been provided?
3. Provide written examples, if possible.

The survey results were reviewed both directly and by analyzing responses based on population size, economic region, and UBCM regional chapter. The analysis found that while most local governments have undertaken some level of asset management training, most of this training occurs at annual workshops or conferences and is primarily attended by staff who are asset management practitioners.


Key insights from the 2024 CCBF Compliance Survey are as follows:

- 11% reported no training (20 out of 185).



1. Background:

On September 19, 2005, Union of British Columbia Municipalities (“UBCM”), the Government of Canada (“Canada”) and the Province of British Columbia (the “Province”) entered into the Agreement on the Transfer of Federal Gas Tax Revenues under the New Deal for Cities and Communities 2005 - 2015 (the “First Agreement”). The First Agreement was focused on achieving three environmental sustainability outcomes: reduced greenhouse gas emissions, cleaner water and cleaner air with reliable and predictable funding. Effective April 1, 2014, UBCM, Canada and the Province entered into the Administrative Agreement on the Federal Gas Tax Fund in British Columbia (the “Second Agreement”). The First Agreement was terminated as of April 1, 2014, and transitioned to the Second Agreement. The Second Agreement built on the First Agreement, and focused on helping communities build and revitalize public infrastructure that supports national objectives of productivity and economic growth, a clean environment and strong cities and communities. Effective April 1, 2024, UBCM, Canada and the Province entered into the Administrative Agreement on the Canada Community-Building Fund (the “Third Agreement”). The Second Agreement was terminated as of April 1, 2024, and transitioned to the Third Agreement, including any unspent funds as of the conclusion of the Second Agreement. The Third Agreement continues the focus of the Second Agreement and is effective until March 31, 2034.

Under the Third Agreement, funding is provided to local governments and other eligible recipients in British Columbia for a variety of capital and planning projects through three delivery mechanisms: a Community Works Fund, a Metro Vancouver Regional Fund (previously named Greater Vancouver Regional Fund under the Second Agreement), and a Strategic Priorities Fund. The Third Agreement includes the following eligible project categories:

- (a) Local roads and bridges;
- (b) Highways;
- (c) Short-sea shipping;
- (d) Short-line rail;
- (e) Regional and local airports;
- (f) Broadband connectivity;
- (g) Public transit;
- (h) Drinking water;
- (i) Wastewater;
- (j) Solid waste;
- (k) Community energy systems;
- (l) Brownfield redevelopment;
- (m) Sport infrastructure;
- (n) Recreational infrastructure;
- (o) Cultural infrastructure;
- (p) Tourism infrastructure;
- (q) Resilience (previously ‘Disaster mitigation’ in the Second Agreement);
- (r) Fire halls; and
- (s) Capacity building.

UBCM administers funding under both the Second and Third Agreements, and is responsible for reporting to Canada and the Province on the use of funding and outcomes achieved in accordance with the terms of the Second and Third Agreements.

2. Basis of accounting:
